- Annual Teaching Plan: At the beginning of the academic year Annual Teaching Plan is submitted by every teacher for the subject(s) taught by him/her.
- ➤ **Daily Teaching Report**: Daily Teaching Report is maintained by the teachers in their academic diary provided by the college to every teacher.
- ➤ **Monthly Teaching Report**: At the end of every month, the daily teaching report maintained by the teacher is verified by the Vice Principal.
- ➤ **Attendance**: Attendance of students is recorded daily in the attendance book and the names of students whose attendance is below 75 % are submitted at the end of every month to the Vice Principal for necessary action.

- ➤ Internal Tests: Two Internal Tests were conducted during the first term (before Dipawali) and in the second Term on the basis of the syllabus completed during the said term(s)
- ➤ In addition to seminars, viva voce, group discussions are arranged in the classes in order to develop soft skills of the students.
- As per the university norms, all UG- final year students complete project work on environmental studies.
- In all the three faculties i.e. Arts, Science and Commerce, the assessment of teachers by students is undertaken through regular monthly feedback and open discussion with students.
- Faculty-wise Coordination Committee meetings are arranged in each term in which discussion on feedback about the assessment of teachers by students is undertaken and remedial measures planned accordingly.
- In our IGNOU centre, the Foundation, UG/PG courses are based on self-study oriented curriculum, practical oriented syllabus, employment –oriented curriculum, curriculum as per changing time and need, flexibility in syllabi.
- In addition to this, Blood Donation Camp, Elocution Competition, Rangoli Competition, Handwriting Competition were organized.
- Assessment of Teachers by students is done at the end of every year through feedback and action is taken accordingly.
- At the beginning of academic year, last year's results are analyzed in the Coordination Committee meeting. Finalization of subject combinations is also done in this meeting.

The college has formed a career counselling committee for students. They inform students about better career opportunities. Related advertisements are displayed on the notice board. Moreover, they also arrange expert teachers and seminars for counselling students.

Psycho-social Counselling:

During the course of their studies, students come across various issues. They are, at times, too immature to handle the problems. The College provides them personal counseling. They can share their problems with the teachers. The teachers concerned are very supportive and help them to overcome these issues. The candidates, when they come face to face with certain social issues or problems which tend to bring an inferiority complex in them. Teachers ensure that no such deterioration occurs in the psycho-social status of the students. They are counseled to become better human beings and advised to face problems bravely. The college has a women's cell, students counsel, health and hygiene cell etc. These cells guide students in many personal, social and psychological matters. Moreover, the programmes by these cells also focus on their psychological and social issues. The College organizes a special event for the parents of the girl students. Under this event mothers of girl students are invited to the College. The parents are shown the various facilities the College provides for their daughters and also stress on the social security made available for the girl students. This activity is carried out to repose confidence among the parents regarding the social security of their daughters.

Group Counseling: At the beginning of every academic year the College Principal and senior members of the faculty give an opening address to the students elaborating on academic opportunities, career prospects and opportunities for financial support available to students. The lectures are informative as well as morale boosters for the students. Students are also informed about various support services available in the College. They are advised to contact the Principal or any other faculty member if they face any problem.

Career Guidance: There is a separate room in the building for Career Guidance and Placement unit. Dr. Deepak Waghmare is the convener of the Cell. A special notice board is also allotted to the cell for displaying all the relevant and useful notices for the students.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The College strives to recruit and retain teachers who are competent, experienced and experts in their field of study. Vacancies in any department are advertised in local as well as national newspaper and after following the due procedure appointments are made.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

There is a separate selection norm which needs to be followed for faculty and staff recruitment. The candidates appear for the interviews and as per the stipulated procedure marks are allotted to the candidates based on various attributes -NET, Ph.D., M.Phil., rank, experience, publications, and interview. In the interview, personality, communication skills, computer knowledge, teaching ability, proficiency in ICT and soft-skills are given weightage as per PBAS (Performance Based Appraisal System).

After the interview the most deserving candidates are selected by the panel and appointment letters are given. Thereafter approval is sought from Joint Director of Higher Education and the affiliating University.

All employees of the aided colleges are paid by the state government at the UGC Scale. The staff is also provided facilities like casual leave, medical leave etc. They can also avail study leave to upgrade their academic qualification.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The institution interacts with a number of research institutions and laboratories across the country mainly in its capacity as a higher education centre that gets its faculty trained in these research establishments. Our faculty undergoes doctoral research in these institutions and this leads to academic co-operation between them and our institutions. The numerous seminars, workshops and other academic events the departments host, also pave way for collaborative interactions with a number of research establishments in the country.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

The college ensures wide publicity for admission through Institutional website, Advertisement in Regional Newspapers and through Prospectus. The admission procedure is duly mentioned in the prospectus. List of selected candidates is displayed on notice board for public. The admission process is conducted as per the rules and regulations laid down by the S.R.T.M. University Nanded and government of Maharashtra. Admission is given strictly on the basis of merit with clear provision for reservation of seats for backward communities as per State Government rules. The students are selected for admission according to their academic records. After collecting admission application forms, the merit lists are prepared. The merit lists are displayed on the notice board and students are asked to pay their fees within a stipulated time period. The reserve quota admission and their merit lists are simultaneously announced. The college strictly observes the rules of admission regarding the quotas of SC, ST, OBC and handicapped candidates in the institution.




1. Why were you prefer this college?






Majority of the students preferred P.N. College because of its reputation, some of them for availability of courses and as their convenience. While a very few of them preferred it unknowingly.

3. How frequently do you attend your class?




The response shows that students are conscious to attend the classes. The greatest number of students regularly attended the college while some of them twice or once in a week or as per their convenience.

4. If not attending regularly, what are the reasons?




The reason given by more than half of the irregular students; for their irregularity' is their individual problem and job. While a few of irregular students failed to attend the college because of inconvenient time table.

5. Do you have adequate background so as to gain from the curriculum




Most of the students have sufficient background so as to get from the curriculum while, one fourth of the students have more than requirement. A less student has insufficient.

6. Was the curriculum easy to understand or difficult




7. Whether scheduled classes conduct regularly?


8. What percentage of curriculum is completed in the class?

9. Are seminars, guest lectures related to curriculum arranged?



10. Do the teachers come prepared for the class?




Most of the students discovered that teachers came for the class with preparation, while negligible number of students responds that without preparation.

11. Do the teachers communicate with you?




Student's views about teacher's communicative approach are positive. Teachers have a rapport with students which helps them to have a healthy interaction.


12. Are your teachers available when you approach them during college working hours?

13. Do the teachers allow students to participate in teaching learning process?




The greatest number of students experienced that teachers allowed students to participate in teaching learning process.


14. If yes, what system is adopted?

15. Do the teachers provide information about Competitive Exams, Interviews, new opportunities, new curriculum?




Maximum students remarked, the teachers provided information about competitive exams, interviews, new opportunities & new curriculum. A few number of students opined as sometimes.

16. What is your observation about the teachers' approach?




The standpoint of the students about the teachers approach is ranging from cooperative to always co-operative. While negligible numbers of students said could not.

- Teachers are instructed to have personal touch with the students so as to have a one-to-one conversation on various aspects.


17. What is your view about the internal evaluation?

18.Do you feel the internal evaluation system effects your grades?




Majority of the students discovered the internal evaluation system is helpful to improve their grades. While minimal number of students has not found any effect on grades.

19. Do you participate in any other co-curricular activities?




Most of the students show their inclination to participate in any other co-curricular activities. While a few students opined that, Non-participation in any other co-curricular activities.

20. Your view about the Teaching method adopted?




Student's stance about the adopted teaching method is good. A few students viewed it as appropriate or satisfactory while negligible number of students remarked if as unsatisfactory.



- 22. Does the College have sufficient number of computers for practical use?





- 24. Your view about the service of Library and the quality of books offered?




More than half of the students remarked, the books offered b library are sufficient. While, a few number of students varies from sufficient to insufficient.
